To meet the increased need for training in global perspectives, the interdisciplinary International Studies major educates students to appreciate the social, cultural, political, and economic characteristics of national, regional, and global communities. It is based on the conviction that historically informed and politically aware students with knowledge of more than one language will be able to think more critically and act more responsibly in a shrinking world. Students who successfully complete this major improve their opportunity for further study in graduate or professional school and careers in government service, private enterprise, international governmental and non-governmental organizations, non-profit education, research and advocacy organizations, and teaching.

Requirements for the Major

International studies majors take 12 courses: an introductory course; two courses each in the following four areas: economics/international business, history, modern languages, and political science; two related electives; and a capstone course. The language courses must be at the 200 level or above and the history and political science courses must be at the 300 level or above. As part of the liberal learning requirements, it is recommended that students take microeconomics and statistics. These requirements differ slightly for the concentration in international economics and trade, which mandates three courses in economics/international business and one related elective.

Each student will select one major concentration from among six. Concentrations are offered in four geographic areas: Europe, Latin America and the Caribbean, the Middle East, and East Asia, and two functional subjects: diplomacy, and international economics and trade. Course requirements differ by concentration; please see the program planner for requirements. The related electives and the study abroad experience should be relevant to the concentration chosen.

Study abroad is an important component of the major. Students are required to demonstrate at least one semester of successful academic achievement in a foreign university, although a year's study is encouraged. Please consult your International Studies advisor and the Office of Global Programs for the most suitable site and program.

Elective courses in the major must have an international focus, complement the student's interest within the major and receive prior approval by an International Studies advisor. Students are also encouraged to pursue an internship with an international focus.

INT 200/International Studies: Processes, Themes, and Issues

1 course unit

(fall semester)

Discussion of themes and problems in international studies using the insights of economics, international business, history, political science, language, and culture. Themes include social change, historical processes, globalization, ethnic and national identity, cultural interaction, and the role of values in public affairs. Required for all students majoring in international studies.

INT 250/International Study Tour (topic varies)

International Studies-13

Combines on-campus classroom instruction with a conducted tour of economic, cultural, and political sites in selected countries or regions. Designed to provide an integrated, interdisciplinary, geographically focused experiential learning opportunity. Individual sections of the course will examine particular geographical areas e.g., Western Europe, Caribbean, Mexico.

Examines the evolution of human rights movements since World War II and their influence on the behavior of nation states and other transnational actors. Major topics considered include: the history of the contemporary human rights movement, realism and liberalism in international relations theory, human rights in American foreign policy, and the role of non-state actors in international affairs. Significant attention may also be given to non-U.S. perspectives, selected regional issues, and current topics such as: women's rights, terrorism, self-determination, globalization, forced labor, democratization, and humanitarian intervention.

INT 350/International Trade in the Caribbean

(occasionally) (same as INB 350) *Prereauisite:* ECO 101 or ECO 102

Examines trade relationships, flows, and structures in the context of historical experiences, contemporary political relationships, and economic imperatives. With a focus on the Caribbean region, the course also looks at how international trade processes actually work.

INT 352 History of the Caribbean

(same as HIS 364) (alternate years) Examines the history of the diverse people, communities, and nations of the Caribbean Basin. A mid-level course in the History Department and the foundational course for the Caribbean concentration.

INT 355 Political Economy of Natural Resources

(same as POL355) (alternate years)

Designed to give advanced undergraduates an introduction to scholarship on the politics of natural resource use; combines theoretical material with study of detailed cases that vary as regards the type of natural resource, the geographic and historical setting, and the appropriate level of analysis.

INT 360 Comparative Political Economy of Development

(same as POL 352)

(occasionally)

Provides a political economy approach to the puzzle of why some countries are rich and others are poor, and why, among the latter, some have been able to achieve rapid rates of growth and others have not. Includes discussion of theories of the role of the state in economic development and issues confronting the developing world today.

INT 365 African Cinema: Francophone African Experience Through Film 1 course unit (same as AAS 365)

(spring semester)

Offers an in-depth exploration of Francophone African cinema by Africans in front of and behind the camera. Re-evaluates Africa through Western cinematic production and critically examines the now Africanized gaze, as Africans start to film themselves. Theories of colonialism and postcolonialism are incorporated through lectures and readings to give students an in-depth yet intelligible understanding of the history and cultures of Africa, while they are introduced to filmic techniques.

INT 370/470/Special Topics in International Studies

(occasionally)

Current or specialized topics. May be taken for credit more than once if content differs.

INT 390 Research Seminar

(periodically)

(permission of instructor)

Working in teams, students conduct research to further their interests and contribute to the instructor's project(s). The professor determines topic, problem, research design, and relevant sources. Students unearth, analyze, and report on findings. Open to majors and non-majors alike with permission of the instructor.

INT 391/Independent Study in International Studies

(every semester) *Prerequisites:* Student proposal must be approved prior to registration by faculty member supervising the project

Independent reading or research pursued under supervision of a faculty advisor.

INT 399/Internship in International Studies

(every semester)

Prerequisites: Completion of internship proposal and approval of faculty supervisor Supervised field experience in a public or private organization with an international focus; readings and an analytic paper place the experience in scholarly perspective. May be repeated for credit; no more than two course units may be counted toward the major.

INT 410 Global Inequalities

(same as PHL 430 when the topics are "Global Inequalities" or "Just War and Humanitarian Intervention)

(occasionally)

Prerequisites: ECO335 or POL250 or POL380 or PHL350 or permission of the instructor Provides advanced students in International Studies with a framework for integrating their previous courses in area studies, international political economy, development studies, and international ethics into a comprehensive understanding of one of the major challenges facing the international community in the 21st centruy, the eradication of extreme poverty.

INT 495-496/Thesis in International Studies

(every semester) *Prerequisite:* Student proposal must be approved prior to registration by faculty member supervising the thesis Students will design and complete an original paper of substantial length under the direction of a faculty adviser.

INT 498/Senior Seminar in International Studies

1 course unit

(spring semester)

Advanced study through individual research and formal seminar reports on broad topics in international studies. Topics chosen will prompt students to use the insights of economics/international business, history, political science, language, and culture to understand social change in local, regional, and global communities. Student research culminates in a substantial paper. Required as capstone course for all students majoring in international studies.
